Captain Martin reported that the Sheriff's Office is still following the COVID 19 protocol of temperature check before starting shifts and wearing masks while interacting with the public. He also reported;

- the individual loitering in Freshfields violated the no-trespass order that was issued has been

arrested. The individual was released but is not allowed on the Freshfields property unless conducting business.

- off-duty deputies are assisting the Community Association in directing traffic during road resurfacing
- contact has been made with the Aviation Authority to schedule training for the bicycle patrol officers so that they can begin in the spring
- two deputies were involved in collisions with their Town patrol vehicles. One involved a deputy striking a fire hydrant in Freshfields, damaging his vehicle's passenger doors, the deputy was uninjured. In the other, the deputy was on his way home when he was struck from behind by a DUI driver and recovering. Both vehicles are in the process of being repaired, and temporary replacement vehicles are being used.

Chairman Connolly asked about items being stolen out of vehicles reported by Ms. Johnstone. Captian Martin indicated that no incident reports had been filed, but both permanent and off-duty deputies had been notified and would be checking the parking lots more frequently for people acting suspiciously around vehicles. He cautioned residents on leaving valuables in unlocked vehicles.

Ms. Tillerson questioned the location of cameras that are able to scan or identify vehicle license plates. Lt. Brokaw stated that the only place he was aware of was at the entrances and exits of Freshfields. Mr. Elder confirmed a camera was also located that the Main Gate. If a vehicle is captured, information on the owner can be requested through the Sherriff's Office

Chief Walz reported that she is happy with the progress that is being made on the construction of Station 4. She indicated that there are still loose ends on Station 6 with how the apron meets the road that is being addressed.

Chief Walz stated that during August and September, there were no reported COVID cases in the department; however, four cases have been confirmed in the last few days, and the number is expected to rise during the upcoming holidays.

Chief Walz reported the squad vehicle reported to have been involved in a collision was totaled. The video footage of the accident shows that airbags were responsible for neither of the passengers being injured. A new vehicle is in the process of getting equipped to replace the second squad used for special events such as the upcoming PGA.

Chief Abrams stated that despite better performance than last month, this was the second month of less than stellar performance and great concern to him and the committee members. He reported nineteen calls for service to Kiawah during October. Ten calls had a response time of over twenty minutes, with nine calls under eighteen minutes. He noted that some immediate changes were made to include the relocation of the delta supervisor, traditionally located at Medic 7 Station, across from the high school to Medic 10 Station on Betsy Kerrison. This would provide a paramedic at that location to increase response time to Kiawah and Seabrook. He discussed the challenge of providing more resources in the area. His request for additional full-time equivalents and three ambulances had been cut from the budget. Still, work is being done to include them in the budget this year, along with additional ambulances over the next five years. In an effort to manage the geography and volume of the rural areas that include Kiawah, he discussed the implementation of a pilot program to offer overtime shifts that would provide more coverage and better response times in those areas.

D. Beach Patrol

Mr. Edgerton discussed the long-term goal of Beach Patrol becoming certified by DHEC as a basic responder agency. The application has been submitted and is pending the receipt of two permits and two inspections to be performed. The approval would allow the employees to maintain their certifications as EMTs with internal training and not rely on an outside training program.

Mr. Edgerton stated that while Beach Patrol works year-round, the USLA certification designation

is a seasonal agency. The requirement to staffing EMTs year-around is being met to obtain the year-around USLA certification. The application will be submitted during the next research cycle in the spring. The certification would make Kiawah one of the only beaches on the east coast north of Daytona that is a USLA certified year-round agency and additional service to the Town.

Mr. Edgerton also stated he had been working with the committee working on updating the shark protocol.

Chairman Connelly stated that most probably do not know all the services provided by Beach Patrol and that she was impressed by their knowledge of shark identification and responses. She suggested a presentation to provide a better understanding of the services they provide.

Mr. Elder reported that the request for two additional dedicated patrol officers was approved in the passing of the budget. When fully staffed, the patrol officers will be working with the Town's code enforcement to coordinate resources.

Mr. Elder reported that next year, the intent is to distribute RFID tags to all owners before the PGA so that the bar code reader can be removed. He also indicated the Community Association has four ALPR cameras, two on the entry and two on the exit lanes providing data on vehicles.

Chairman Connelly questioned the reporting of a break-in in a neighborhood. Mr. Elder indicated an email was received by a homeowner who was dissatisfied that a robbery was not widely reported. He clarified that the incident was a burglary into an unoccupied dwelling that was unlocked. The incident is under investigation by the County and is pointing to not being a random burglary but an individual that had inside information. He indicated that the release of information on any incident is up to the Sheriff's Office and the Town and would be reported in tandem with the Community Association.

Discussion of the incident included information obtained during the investigation, which showed the incident was not a random burglary but a crime of opportunity rather than a neighborhood threat. Also discussed was a reminder to use extreme caution when allowing access to a home when valuables are not secured.

V. New Business:

A. Discussion of Shark Protocols

Chairman Connelly stated that similar to the work done earlier in the year on alligator activity Mayor requested a review and updated the Town's Shark Protocol. The review team included Mr. Williams, Ms. MacDonald, and Mr. Edgerton with Beach Patrol. A conference call was arranged with a professor from Florida who is an expert on sharks and their behavior, followed by outlining what would happen if a shark was identified on the beach on Kiawah.

Mr. Edgerton indicated that typically a beach patron would notify Beach Patrol of a shark sighting. A staff member will go location and maintain a presence in the area for some time depending on the area's population or activity and if the shark sighting can be confirmed. Usually, the threat passes on its own, and normal activities are resumed.

Chairman Connelly stated that Beach Patrol is responsible for monitoring the water for sharks' presence and making an immediate decision on advising swimmers to leave the water. If a determination is made to close the beach for longer than a day, the Mayor and the Town Administrator would be notified, and a discussion would take place. She noted that the basics are outlined, and the protocol is in place in the event it is needed.

VI. Chairman's Updates

Chairman Connelly suggested sending out, in one of the Town's publications, a reminder of the importance of house and vehicle safety and monitoring for identity theft, especially with the holidays coming up.

VII. Committee Members' Comments:

Ms. Johnstone reported that in preparation for the PGA, there are meetings taking place in the large and small perspective to cover items such as security, parking, emergency management, communications, along with finalizing the signing of a hospital. She indicated that work is progressing towards having a full spectator event, but it is not promised.

Ms. Johnstone also reported that it was discovered that three Resort employees who were not furloughed that has their social security numbers used to file for unemployment benefits. She noted that unemployment, in general, is seeing a surge in fraud and to be on guard for anything suspicious.

Ms. Beier reported that Freshfields was preparing for the holidays but will not have traditional Thanksgiving weekend festivities due to COVID. She indicated scaled-back holiday events would include some live musical performances, Santa will be replaced with "letters to Santa," and there will be additional socially distanced events in December.

Mr. Thomae reported the construction of Station 6 is at this point approximately 50% complete, on schedule, and on budget with a substantial completion date of April 5, 2021, and a final completion date of May 14, 2021, in time for the PGA

Ms. Tillerson reported that a Town employee test positive for COVID. Once she received the notification Town Hall was COVID cleaned, and all employee was encouraged to get tested. She noted that all other employees were tested with a negative result for all but three that are still waiting. The employee who tested positive is not expected to return until after November 30th or until a negative test result is received along with a release from their physician.

Ms. Tillerson stated the Town's current emergency ordinance regarding the mandated usage of face masks and other requirements would expire on December 5th. She indicated that at a Special Call meeting following the swearing-in ceremony, the new Mayor and Council will address the ordinance with the option of just extending the date or making changes to the ordinance restrictions.

Ms. Johnstone reported that the Resort would have Santa Claus riding on the ladder truck on

November 27th. She indicated that the truck's decorating will begin at 12:30 and a small parade for the kids between 1:00 and 3:00 from the East Beach Conference Center to Night Park on Kiawah.

Ms. Tillerson stated the Town has not received a special event permit application for the "Party in the Park" event and does not anticipate that the event will be held this year.

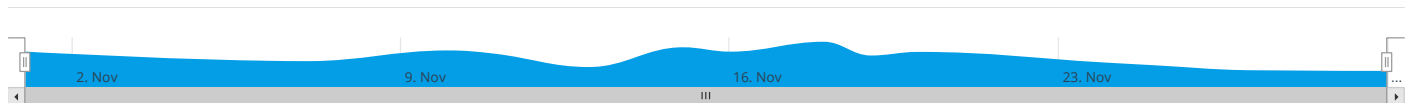
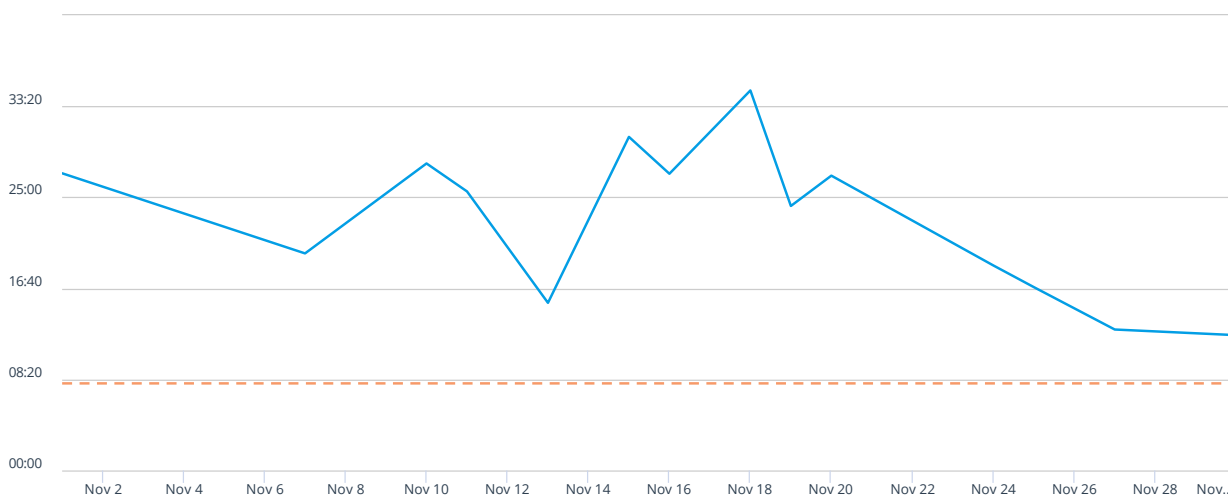
